Course Description

This course is an elective in the Studies in Rhetoric and Composition sequence of the English M.A. curriculum. In order to improve students' upper division and graduate level writing across the disciplines and strengthen connections between reading and writing, the Advanced Academic Writing course will engage students with composing in scholarly genres that require effective application of rhetoric and writing studies approaches to original research and analysis; integrating, citing, and documenting sources; and synthesizing information with a view toward publication in professional, academic outlets in students' areas of disciplinary focus. This course is cross listed with PRFS 412: Advanced Academic Writing and LBST: 512: Advanced Academic Writing.

Course Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

Rhetorical Knowledge

Compose original research in multiple academic genres (i.e., proposals, conference papers, and presentations) for a variety of audiences and contexts.

Critical Thinking, Reading, and Composing

Analyze academic conversations by rhetorically reading a variety of academic texts (e.g., calls for papers, journal articles, conference papers, and presentations).

Processes

Synthesize reliable sources.

Conventions

Apply ethically the student's chosen academic citation style (e.g., MLA, APA, and Chicago).

Select the appropriate genre conventions, language, grammar, and rhetorical style for the writer's purpose, audience, and context.

Blackboard Course Site Overview

Your supplemental instructional materials and all of your assignments will be posted on Blackboard. Currently, our Blackboard site always opens up to the "START HERE" page, which includes an overview of the course, important course documents (syllabus, schedule, and grade contract), and directions for setting up the course on your mobile phones. The left column has links to various course content. In the top section, you can access the syllabus, grade contract, announcements, and online office hours. In the "Course Content" section, you have links for the module assignments, additional assignments, and weekly modules. Clicking on "Course Modules" sends you to a page that houses folders for each week of the course. Clicking on a module folder provides an overview of the week, readings for the week, and the assignments due that week. In the "Tools" section, you can check your grades (which will be updated every 1-2 weeks) and send an email to your instructor. Finally, the "Resources" section has USI resources that you might find helpful not only in this course, but in other courses (even face-to-face courses). Should you have any trouble finding information, please feel free to reach out to me. I'm always happy to answer any questions you have about the course.

Minimum Digital Information Literacy Skills

Digital information literacy refers to the ability to locate, evaluate, apply, create, and communicate knowledge using technology.

Examples of digital information literacy skills include:

2. Using computer networks to locate and store files or data;
3. Using online search tools for specific academic purposes, including; the ability to use search criteria, keywords, and filters;

Assessments

Research Journal

Your research journal assignments are low-stakes writing assignments designed to engage with the course material in each module. Each module will include directions and grade information for that module's research journal assignment. Most research journal assignments will be in the form of responses to the module's texts and/or additional research conducted by the student. All assignments are noted in the schedule, and all assignments will be posted to Blackboard.

Writing Assignments

Your writing assignments are more polished products from your research this semester. Several of the writing assignments will lead up to your conference paper and presentation at the end of the course. This semester, you will compose a **proposal**, an **annotated bibliography**, a **methodology report**, a **conference paper**, and a **conference presentation**. Directions and grading information for each writing assignment will be included in the module in which the writing assignment is due. All writing assignments are noted in the schedule, and all assignments will be posted to Blackboard.

Metacognitive Reflections (For A Students only)

Students working toward an A will complete weekly metacognitive reflections in which they contemplate their prior knowledge, current knowledge, and potential transfer routes for what they have learned throughout the semester. Directions for each metacognitive reflection will be included in the module in which the reflection is due. All metacognitive reflections are noted in the schedule, and all assignments will be posted to Blackboard.

Grading Methods

Grade Contract

I do not feel it is fair to evaluate you in a traditional way through points and percentages that lead to an overall grade. Instead, this class is centered on your labor. Thus, your course grade is determined by a Grade Contract, which details the number of projects you are to complete for the grade you choose, and you will be assessed on successful and timely completion of the projects. All of your projects will have detailed formative feedback to help you grow throughout the term; I feel feedback is much more beneficial than a one-dimensional grade. Also, you will

likely become a better writer (and enjoy writing more) in the long term if you learn to assess your own writing.

So how are grades calculated? Grades correspond to the amount of work a student completes throughout the semester. An A student, then, completes more work than a C student. Don't worry, though! All of your assignments have detailed descriptions and include formative feedback, so you will know if you are on track for completing your assignments. Moreover, you can revise a project as many times as you need in order to pass the project.

In short, each assignment will be graded on a Pass/Revise and Resubmit scale:

- Your work will receive a pass (P) or revise and resubmit (R) marks rather than points.
- Revise and resubmit (R) work is not yet acceptable and needs to be revised and resubmitted until passed to count. You can revise as many times as you need!

SafeAssign

SafeAssign is a problematic tool, and one that composition instructors should question ethically before employing it in their courses. At the outset, SafeAssign appears to be a harmless tool to discourage plagiarism. However, SafeAssign collects and aggregates students' data, and then uses that data to detect plagiarism in a rather faulty manner by noting any recurring phrases and citations as plagiarism. Moreover, when an instructor uses SafeAssign, they send the message that the student is guilty of plagiarism without even working with the student first. While SafeAssign may discourage plagiarism, there are other far more effective methods for preventing plagiarism, such as well-structured assignments, scaffolded instruction for synthesizing and integrating secondary sources, and anti-discriminatory grading methods.

As such, I do *not* use SafeAssign and I do *not* encourage any writing instructors to use it, either.
